7 Insanely Useful Tools for Bloggers

Criticue

Want critical feedback about your site from complete strangers because your friends are tired of you asking them for their advice? <u>Criticue.com</u> is a site where you can ask for feedback and "pay" with your feedback on other sites.

The key to getting the most out of these critiques is to be specific when asking for feedback. "What could you improve?" or "Do you have any advice?" are too general to elicit useful responses.

Ask for specific feedback about one or two aspects of the page you're submitting, like:

- Is the purpose of the site clear?
- Do you trust the site? Why or why not?
- Do you believe the claims of the site?
- Would you enter your email address? Why or why not?

It's important to also take the feedback with a grain of salt. This is a random sampling of individuals with a bias towards people who are also running internet businesses (they're giving feedback because they themselves want feedback). Their feedback may be useful but they also bring their own prejudices and preconceived notions, which may impact their critique.

All of the responses are moderated by a human being so you can be sure that you won't get obvious spam critiques. There is also a rating system so you can review the credibility of a responder.

Finally, and this is critical, do not change your site simply because someone says something negative. They're just one voice and they may not be your target reader. You should, however, read each one and use it to discover any blind spots you might have about your site.

Fresh eyes never hurt.

Copyscape

Copyscape

Trust but verify – as the saying goes!

A lot of bloggers use staff writers to help produce and manage content on their sites. In many cases, freelance staff writers write for multiple sites around similar subjects, so there's always the concern that a writer might borrow from someone else or themselves.

The risks of duplicate content are well understood, search engines don't like it, and as site owners, we never want to publish someone else's work and pass it off as our own. That's why a service like Copyscape is so important for bloggers – you can use it to check the work of your staff writers.

Copyscape Premium Search costs 5 cents a search but will scour the internet on your behalf to look for instances of the text you send it. It'll list the results and give you a comparison tool that shows you what parts of the content they found on a live page.

If you use freelance contributors, I recommend sending some of their work through Copyscape just to confirm they haven't "borrowed" that work from somewhere else, even if they copied from themselves elsewhere.

The cost is modest, 5 cents a search with a minimum purchase of \$5 (100 searches).

Free Alternative: You can do a similar search by using the <u>allintext search operator</u> in Google. Google limits this search to just 32 words but it's also free, so you can search as many 32 word blocks as you'd like.

Xenu's Link Sleuth m

Xenu Link Sleuth is a very powerful website crawler that will help you find broken links on your site. I use the simplest option and just have it crawl my entire site, which means it'll find any broken link whether it's internal or external.

Then I filter by Status and take a peek at what it has problems finding – here's a recent run:

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Here's where Xenu gets a little bit clunky.

I highlighted one link that returned a 404 (not found) and to find what page it's on, I need to right click and select URL Properties from the menu

It will reveal this window:

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Now I have to copy the URL, paste it into my browser, and manually fix the broken link.

It's clunky but it requires very little site resources, since it's running on my computer. It's also incredibly fast. Here are some <u>advanced tips for using Xenu</u> that you will almost certainly find useful as well (like <u>find enormous images</u>).

Alternatively, <u>Broken Link Checker</u> is a popular broken link finding tool but it's a Wordpress plugin and a resource heavy Wordpress plugin too. It's far more user friendly though and you can update the links within the plugin's interface, which can save you a ton of time. Just remember to disable it after you run it and fix your links.



Social Locker

Do you have a popular article but you aren't sure what to do with it? My first word of advice is to leave it unlocked and try to get email subscribers with a popup or inline form.

A nice second alternative is to use the Social Locker plugin. Social Locker "locks" your content behind a paywall. Visitors can read what you've locked behind the wall if they like, tweet, or G+1 your page. Once they do, the content is revealed.

This is what it looks like when content is locked:

Once they tweet, like, or +1, the box fades away and the content appears.

There is a premium pay version that offers more features but the free one is pretty robust as it is. Behind the scenes you can see charts of the social shares, which you can use to decide if locking up the content is worth it to you.

Also, implementation is easy, just put the [sociallocker][/sociallocker] tags around content you want to lock.



BrowserShots.org

<u>Browser Shots</u> is exactly what it sounds like, you can get screenshots of what your site looks like in 150+ browser and operating system combinations.

Review your analytics and check which are the most popular Browser & OS combinations, then and check that your site appears as you intend for those combinations. If you're using Google Analytics, it's a Standard Report under **Audience -> Technology ->Browser & OS**.

Google keeps saying they're going to sunset the tool but the announcement was in June 2012 (and they said it'd be retiring in a month) and the tool still exists.

You can get similar functionality in Google Analytics, under In-Page Analytics, but going to <u>http://browsersize.googlelabs.com/</u> is just so much faster.

ButtonOptimizer.com

Need a quick way to generate a button? <u>Button Optimizer</u> is a really simple to use, quick, tool that can make buttons for you. You can download the button as a PNG file or CSS, making it extremely versatile.

Only downside is that you can't import your button back afterwards. Once you close the browser, all of your changes to the sliders and dials revert back to the default. Other than that inconvenience, it's the quickest way I know to make a reasonably nice button.
